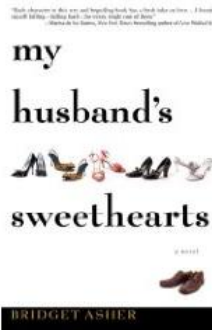

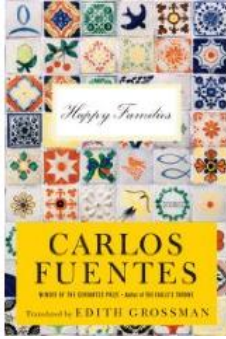
My Husband's Sweethearts by Bridget Asher

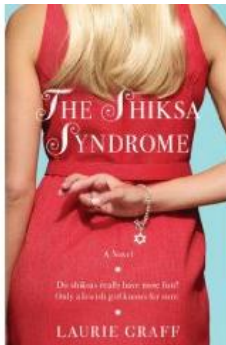
The Ghost in Love by Jonathan Carroll

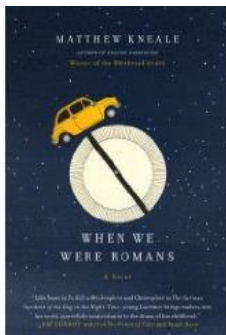
Happy Families: Stories by Carlos Fuentes
